ADMISSION TO THE SOCIAL WORK MAJOR

Formal acceptance to the major requires completed or in-progress final coursework for general education curriculum, required Social Work General Education courses, required Social Work Foundation courses, a completed application, a 2.5 or higher cumulative and 2.8 Social Work curriculum specific GPA, and at least 75 credit hours completed by the end of the semester (or summer) prior to formal admission to the BSSW Program.
