Fred Murray tells the story of running into Joseph Sheehan, who was facilitating the panel, in the hall at the convention, wondering if the panel was going to be audio taped. Sheehan responded that there were no plans to do that, but if Murray could arrange it, that would be all right. Murray, out of his own pocket, found someone to record it for \$100, which at that time was a considerable sum. Thanks to Fred's quick thinking and generosity, this classic has been preserved.

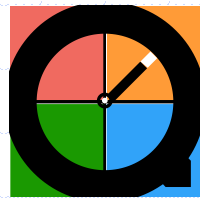



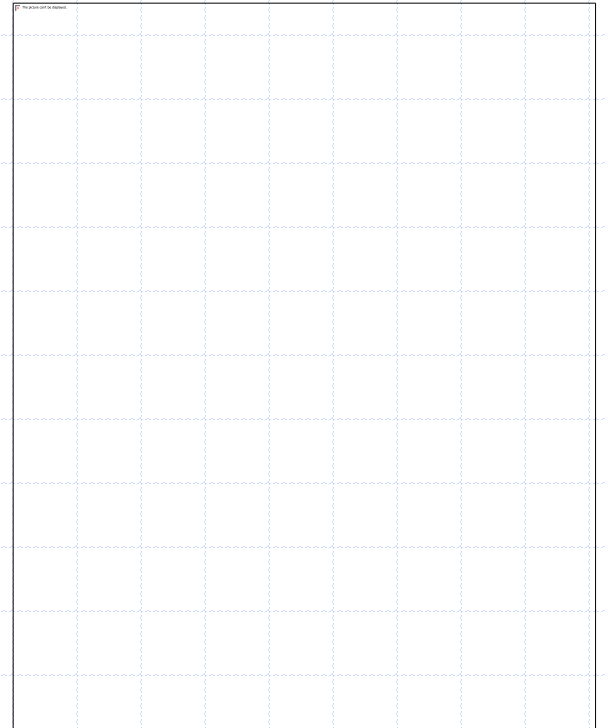

The audio clips below are of people talking about their ideas at the time of the presentation about the nature of stuttering. **Important disclaimer:** The speeches are provided here for their historical significance, and reflect various views. The individuals were explaining their ideas at one point in time and may or may not reflect what they believed later. It is important that information from these clips not be taken as specific treatment suggestions for individuals who stutter. Determination of treatment for stuttering is best done in face-to-face coordination with a certified Speech-Language Pathologist. Two of the tapes by Van Riper (in this section and one in the section below) presented special challenges. The tapes were defective, but when played backwards, they were fine, apparently bleeding through the other side of the tape. The sound editor suggested by Bob Quesal, (Sound Studio) allows you to reverse the sound, making a backwards copy. So the tapes were digitized backwards, and the editor reversed them into pretty good quality recordings. The tapes were part of a series called "Lectures in Speech Pathology and Audiology" and were copyrighted by Luther F. Sies, Ed.D, of the Fine Arts Recording Company, Inc. An internet search found Dr. Sies in Arizona and he gladly consented to allowing the tapes to be placed online.

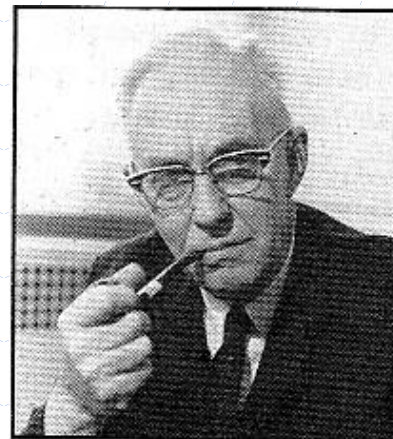

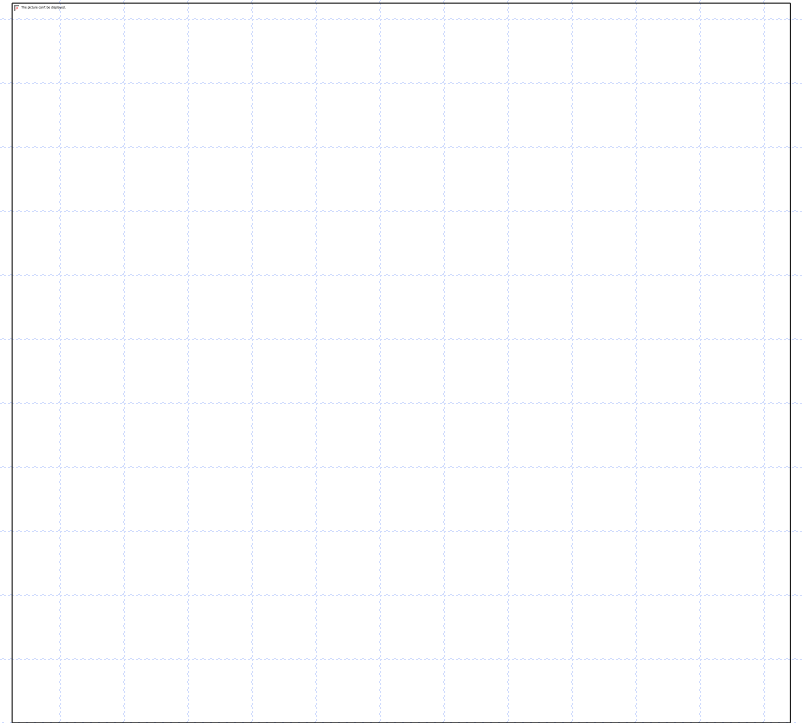

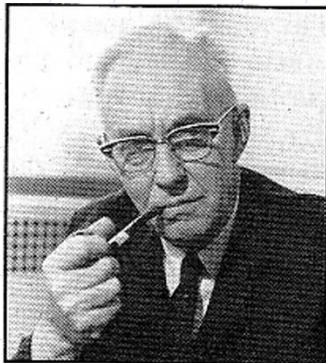

About the presenter: Anders Lundberg writes, "I'm 56, and have been stuttering the last 53 years, now to a comfortable degree. Working as a clinical psychologist, specializing in stuttering, for 28 years, and have been combining an SLP-education with a psychologist's. Concentrating on the clinical settings and encounters now after also being active in organizations in stuttering and speech pathology; former lecturer at the University of Göteborg, former president of the Swedish Association of Logopedics and Phoniatrics (SFFL), former president of the Scandinavian Co-operation Council of Logopedics and Phoniatrics (NSLF) and former member of the Fluency Committee of the International Association of Logopedics and Phoniatrics (IALP)."



About the presenter Charles Van Riper was born in Champion, Mich., December 1, 1905. He earned a B.A., Univ. Michigan, Master's Degree at the University of Michigan, specializing in Old English Literature and Elizabethan Ballads; and Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Iowa. He was a Member, Amer. Speech and Hearing Assoc. (Fellow, 1933; Associate Editor, 1939; Councilor, 1950-52). In 1936 he established one of the nation's first speech clinics at Western Michigan in Kalamazoo, which he directed until 1967 when he was appointed Distinguished University Professor, a position he held until his retirement in 1976. He died September 25, 1994.



About the presenter: Bob Quesal, Ph.D., CCI Illinois University where he serves as Program coordinator of the Steering Committee for ASL (Fluency and Fluency Disorders) and is a member of the Association's Research Committee. He is a member of the Specialty Board in Fluency Disorders. He earned his Ph.D. from Iowa in 1984 and was Dean Williams's penultimate

About the presenter Dean Williams was a clinician, teacher, and researcher in the area of speech in Iowa City, Iowa, receiving his Bachelor's degree at Florida State University, and his Master's degree at Iowa. After working several years at Indiana University of Iowa in the 1950's where he worked as a professor until his retirement in 1987. Williams was a Fellow of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association from which he had also received its highest award, Honors of the Association. Charles Van Riper was born in Champion, Mich., December 1, 1905. He earned a B.A., Univ. Michigan, Master's Degree at the University of Michigan, specializing in Olde English and Old English; and Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Michigan (1950-52). In 1936 he established one of the first speech clinics at Western Michigan in Kalamazoo, which he directed until his retirement in 1976. He died September 25, 1994.



Joseph Green Sheehan was born in Battle Creek, Michigan. Sheehan "overcame a severe stutter" and became a noted authority on speech. He was an educator, clinician, and author. He established the Psychology Speech Clinic at the University of California at Los Angeles in 1949 and directed it until the time of his death, which occurred on November 14, 1983, in Santa Monica, California. 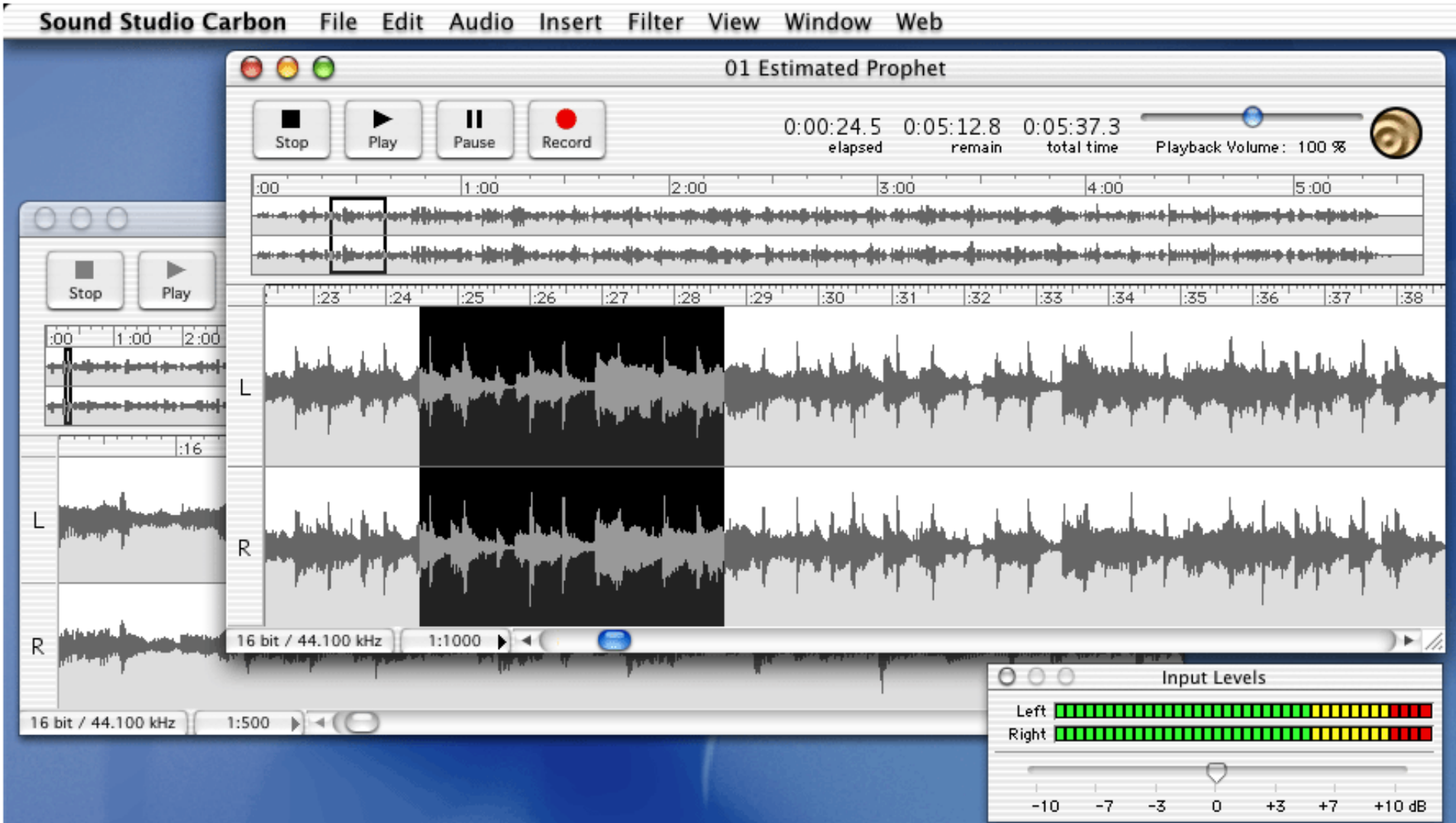
